Did You Know...



Although St. Patrick is considered the "Patron Saint of Ireland," he wasn't Irish and was never officially canonized by the Catholic Church as there was no formal process in the first millennium. ! He was born in Britain (under Roman rule at the time), and at the age of 16, was captured by Irish raiders and taken to Ireland. He spent six years in captivity where he converted to Christianity. He escaped captivity but eventually returned to Ireland as a missionary. He established monasteries, churches, and schools. Two famous legends surrounding St. Patrick are: he drove all the snakes from Ireland and he used the three leaves of the shamrock to explain the Holy Trinity. There are no native species of snakes in Ireland. There is no one "true" species of shamrock. Various clover species are accepted as the shamrock. He died on March 17, 461. He was celebrated by the Irish with feasts and religious services. Irish people started wearing a shamrock in the 18th century to signify their Irish Christian pride. The tradition of celebrating March 17th with parades started in America. The first St. Patrick's Day parade was held in New York City in 1762. Following the potato famine in Ireland, many Irish immigrated to the United States, and the St. Patrick's Day celebration became widespread.

Have we turned the corner with Covid-19, or are we still running an up-hill battle? Are you confused by the many expert opinions about the vaccine, wearing a mask, and social distancing? Are you concerned about traveling in your coach? I wanted to provide you with a little information regarding the several states our chapter will travel to in the coming months with links to find the most up-to-date restrictions.

For Arizona go to: <u>COVID-19 Updates | Visit Arizona</u>. As of 03/15/2021, there were no travel restrictions in the State of AZ. Most municipalities and businesses have implemented face mask requirements. Tribal Lands have implemented their own restrictions.

Up to date information for New Mexico can be found at: <u>New Mexico Covid-19 Traveler Information</u>. New Mexico uses a multi-color tiered threat map. It is updated every two weeks. As of 03/15/2021, face masks were required and there were no mandatory self-quarantine requirements.

For updated Texas Covid-19 restrictions visit: <u>https://www.dshs.state.tx.us/coronavirus/opentexas.aspx</u>. Texas is fully open with continued recommendation to wear face masks. Individual counties retain the right to implement restrictions as deemed necessary.

Colorado uses a color system similar to New Mexico: <u>https://covid19.colorado.gov/data/covid-19-dial-dashboard</u>. Colorado is open for travel with face mask wearing as required. There are no quarantine requirements for traveling in Colorado.

The chapter will continue to require that all members and visitors read/sign a Covid-19 Waiver. We will follow the guidelines of the state/municipality we are visiting and always be considerate of our fellow campers. We are slowly seeing that outdoor venues are going to open for events and festivals. As more and more of us are immunized against the virus, I hope we become comfortable with traveling as a group and plan many fun and interesting outings during 2021.

Since childhood nature has touched my very soul. I could never get enough although sights and sounds are existential, I felt nature, existential and spiritual as well. Oddly enough being a combat soldier in Vietnam I at times felt the beauty of the Central Highlands Jungle and huge yellow moon behind the Mountains. After serving two tours being a paratrooper and later discharged, I was 21 years old.

I have spent tremendous times in nature initially rough camping, camping in a conversion van, and eventually buying a 25' travel trailer. Tires

- Check tire pressure before every outing
- Make sure pressure sensor and valve stem extensions are in good shape
- In some models (Freightliners), make sure the valve stem extensions are firmly secured so they do not rub the rim
- Make sure tires are properly inflated
- Check tires for dry rot or damage; you will rarely "wear out" your tires before these occur.
- You will usually need to replace tires due to age versus mileage

Petrified Forest National Park and Painted Desert

This national treasure, located in Navajo and Apache counties, became a national park in 1962. Known for its petrified wood, painted deserts, fossils, and fallen trees from the late Triassic Period, it's definitely a site worth seeing. Those wishing to visit this national park rather than just driving through the area, have a few options. Two gift shops allow overnight parking in their lots (no hookups). You can also stay in nearby communities (Holbrook, Sun Valley, Saint Johns, and Joseph City). Activities include hiking, backpacking, horseback riding, and guided tours.

- Saturday (after dinner): game night
- Sunday 8:30: Continental breakfast
- Create an itinerary of events/activities going on during that outing (general schedule and no personal information)
- Keep in contact with the wagon master and secretary. The secretary would like to include plans in the newsletter the month prior to the outing, so members have an idea of what to expect at the outing. Remember, nothing is "set in stone," and plans are subject to change. We understand that.

Mexican Taco Meatloaf

My Mexican grandmother would use leftover corn tortilla chips in our meatloaf and everyone loved it! They all wanted seconds along with the recipe. A delicious Mexican-American comfort food.

Directions

Ingredients

1 ½ pounds lean ground beef

1 cup crushed tortilla chips

³⁄₄ cup shredded pepper Jack cheese

1 small onion, chopped

1 (1 ounce) packet taco seasoning mix

2 eggs, beaten

1/2 cup milk

1/4 cup mild red taco sauce, or more to taste

Step 1 Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Step 2 Thoroughly combine beef, tortilla chips, pepper Jack cheese, onion, and taco seasoning in a bowl. Step 3 Whisk eggs, milk, and taco sauce together in a separate bowl. Add to meat mixture and stir until well combined. Step 4

Press mixture into a 9x5-inch loaf pan and top with a strip of taco sauce down the center.

Step 5

Bake in the preheated oven until cooked through and browned on top, 45 to 60 minutes.

Rim the top of each 2 oz. shot glass with frosting. Then, dip in the sanding sugars. Combine equal parts RumChata and Fireball into each shot glass. Top with whipped cream and serve.

Note: It is easier to mix the RumChata and Fireball in a larger container and then pour the mixture into the shot glasses. Make sure to use 1 oz each of the RumChata and Fireball for each drink made.
